Third Sunday of Easter

1st Reading: Acts 3:13-15, 17-19
Responsorial Psalm:Ps 4:2, 4, 7-8, 9
Second Reading:1 Jn 2:1-5a
Gospel:Lk 24:35-48

Just as what was spoken in last week's Gospel, the reading from Luke once again begins with the loving and merciful words, "Peace be with you." The difference between the two readings is the source of the disciples fright. In John's Gospel last week, the disciples were afraid of the Jewish authorities finding and punishing them. They were ashamed of their fear when seeing Jesus. In Luke's Gospel, the disciples "were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost." The important assertion in this reading is that the risen Jesus will be known and experienced in the breaking of the bread. Let's re-read that... "...Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of the bread." There is an action.... an interaction actually. This action brings us to the Cross with Jesus in his death and resurrection, and actively coming into communion with the Risen Christ. In the early Church, the entire Eucharistic celebration was referred to as the breaking of the bread. That's how important the gesture was!

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "The Breaking of Bread, because Jesus used this rite, part of a Jewish meal when as master of the table he blessed and distributed the bread, above all at the Last Supper. It is by this action that his disciples will recognize him after his Resurrection, and it is this expression that the first Christians will use to designate their Eucharistic assemblies; by doing so they signified that all who eat the one broken bread, Christ, enter into communion with him and form but one body in him." (CCC1329)

This week during the Mass, pay particular attention to the moment when the bread is broken. What do you see when the bread is broken? Do you see the broken body of the Crucified One who died to bring us back to the Father? Do you see the Risen One who overcame the power of death and who has opened the gates of Heaven to you? He is there, every time, ready to give himself to you in love.

Family Table Talk

Children: How can you believe in Jesus whom you have never seen?

Youth: Jesus' words of greeting were "Peace be with you," followed by the invitation to forgive sins. How does forgiveness bring peace to you? How does it change the world?

Adults: What strengthens your faith? Why do you believe in Jesus?

APRIL DEVOTION: Holy Eucharist

Via Lucis: Way of the Light!

The Stations of the Light is a spiritual journey with Christ that takes one through fourteen of the most inspiring events of His post-Resurrection life on earth. In the early Church this practice was known as the Via Lucis, or Way of the Resurrection. It invites participants to walk along a path of transforming joy by following in the footsteps of the Risen Christ and his friends.

The Via Lucis was first blessed on Easter Sunday, 1994, in Turin, Italy, the birthplace of St. John Bosco, founder of the Society of St. Francis de Sales (Salesians). It formally became a Roman Catholic devotion, however, at the end of the twentieth century when the Vatican was preparing the Jubilee Year.

During this "Year of Prayer" in preparation for next year's Jubilee, this Easter Season is a wonderful time to pray with this devotion.


