

Palm Sunday - The Triumphant Entrance Into Jerusalem

[1st Reading: Is 50:4-7](#)

[Responsorial Psalm: P. 22:8-9, 17-18, 19-20, 23-24](#)

[Second Reading: Phil 2:6-11](#)

[Gospel: Mk 14:1—15:47](#)

Exiting Mass, we carry with us the Palms of Jesus' Triumphant Entrance into Jerusalem. The blessed palm is a sacramental or an object that is meant to draw us closer to God. At home, you can tuck them behind a religious picture or crucifix. When we use the palms as decoration in the house, it serves as a constant reminder of Palm Sunday and is a beautiful way to stay connected to Holy Week throughout the year.

But whatever you do, don't throw them away!

According to the Code of Canon Law, blessed items which become sacramentals are to be treated with respect and reverence and not discarded in the trash. These sacred signs bear a resemblance to the sacraments (cf. #1171). Throwing them in the trash overlooks their sacred purpose and treats them like any other object we no longer need.



Monday of Holy Week - New Life with Jesus

In today's Gospel, Jesus shares a meal with his friend, Lazarus, who was raised from the dead. Jesus gives us "new life" through Him. Spring is essentially a time where we visibly see new life "spring forth" in nature.

Tuesday of Holy Week - Called and Anointed

The Chrism Mass we celebrate today focuses on the blessing of the holy oils and the chrism which we will use throughout the coming year in the celebration of all Baptisms, Confirmations, Anointings of the Sick and Ordinations in our diocese. We do this, at this special time of year, to remind ourselves that all sacraments and sacramentals draw their power from the paschal mystery of our Lord's suffering, death and resurrection. The oils and the chrism are physical signs of a supernatural reality — the sacramental unity of the Church formed by the anointing of all believers at Baptism and Confirmation, and priests in a special way at Ordination. Wednesday of Holy Week - In Preparation for the Passover

In the time of Jesus, Wednesday was the day before the Jewish Passover which Jesus was about to celebrate with his apostles. In the Jewish tradition, the day before the Passover was a day of cleaning. In today's culture we speak of spring cleaning. In this time of being at home during Holy Week, spend time as a family to do some deep spring cleaning, literally and spiritually. Not only can we find the dirt in the corners of our rooms, but through prayer and an examination of conscience, one can "come clean" of sins and forgive other for wrongdoings. Reflecting on The Lord's Prayer, "...forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us". Spring clean your hearts with an examination of conscience and plan to receive the Sacrament of Penance in the near future.

Holy Thursday - The Institution of the Eucharist

On Holy Thursday we celebrate the institution of the Eucharist as the true Body and Blood of Jesus Christ and the institution of the Sacrament of the Priesthood. The foot washing scene in the Gospel of John is not only meant to be an example of humble service, but primarily a record of the institution of the Christian priesthood and thus the Scriptural root of the sacrament of holy orders. Good Friday - Jesus dies on the Cross

1st Reading: Is 52:13 - 53:12

Psalm Response: Ps 31: 2, 6, 12-13, 15-17, 25

2nd Reading: Heb 4:14-16; 5:7-9

Gospel: Jn 18:1 -19:42

On Good Friday, the world was in darkness, figuratively and literally. Jesus, our Savior was nailed to the cross, suffered and died for our sins as the world was in darkness. "From noon until three in the afternoon darkness came over all the land." (Matt 27:45).

Celebrate @ Home - In this time of "darkness", families can reflect on the what it means to live in darkness, physically and spiritually. Jesus is the light of our salvation, without Him, we are spiritually living in the dark, disconnected from God.

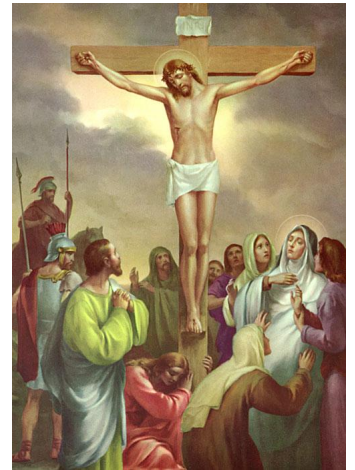
Take this time to "unplug" from noon on Friday through noon Saturday.

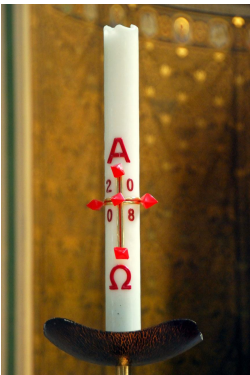

Holy Saturday - We Wait in Vigilance with Faith, Hope and Love

On Holy Saturday the world stands vigil for the resurrection of Jesus. The Easter Vigil celebration begins at dusk. The vigil opens with The Service of Light, which includes the blessing of the new fire, the lighting of candles and of the Paschal Candle to symbolize the Light of Christ, or *Lumen Christi*. Then the assembled faithful hear the scriptural telling of the salvation history. The vigil of Easter was especially devoted to the baptism of catechumens.

Many families dye Easter eggs on this day. You may wonder from where this tradition came. The Romans used to have a saying: *Omne vivum ex ovo*, or "All life comes from an egg." Eggs have long been a symbol of fertility and rebirth. Early Christians in Mesopotamia (modern day Syria and Iraq) dyed chicken eggs red in remembrance of the blood Jesus shed on the cross. By the Middle Ages, the egg also became a symbol of the sealed tomb of Jesus. On Easter Sunday, Christians would carry eggs that they would tap against the eggs of the Christians they greeted. The cracks that formed in these eggs symbolized Jesus breaking out of the tomb.

Celebrate @ Home - Build an Easter Fire in your fireplace or fire pit or light candles to represent the Light of Christ. Sitting by the light, read aloud the scriptures of the vigil liturgy. You may wish to reflect on some of these reading in a lectio divina practice.
